#### Faith and Duty

Luke 17:5-10

I have been a Scout leader for all of my adult life and have recited the Boy Scout Oath literally thousands of times. It is a promise made by Scouts to do all they can for their faith, other people and themselves, in that order of priority.

It begins, "On my honor I will do my best to do my duty to God." That is what our scripture reading this morning from Luke 17 is all about --- doing your duty to God and developing the necessary faith to do just that.

But what are faith and duty and exactly how do we do our duty to God?

David E. Lilienthal once said, "Faith is greater than any bomb! Faith is the most potent weapon ever devised. Do not lose faith in mankind, and in the purposes of the creator. Do not lose faith in the future. Much is being done to promote brotherhood, understanding and peace."

This quote appears on a wall of the Chapel of Peace in the International Peace Garden on the US-Canadian border between Dunseith, North Dakota and Boissevain, Manitoba, Canada.

"Faith is greater than any bomb!"

How much faith do we need?

How to increase their faith was what the apostles were asking Jesus in our scripture reading. They said to Jesus, *"Increase our faith!"* But that was not necessary.

He replied that even the tiniest amount of faith can accomplish miracles equating it to a mustard seed, the tiniest seed referenced anywhere in scripture --- a virtually insignificant seed.

This tiny amount of faith, in the parable, is enough to uproot a mulberry tree and replant it in the sea. But is that a big deal?

Yes indeed. It surely is because the mulberry tree has a vast root system that holds tenaciously to the ground, so much so that even a hurricane is unlikely to dislodge

it. And, of course, if transplanted in the sea it couldn't survive in the salt water.

What Jesus is saying is that even with the tiniest amount of faith miracles can happen, and they will and do every day.

Jesus then talks about a slave or servant, depending upon which Bible translation you read. The servant has jobs to do and he does his duty. Then the master gives the servant even more to do and does not reward him for accomplishing his tasks.

Should the servant expect a reward or a thank you? Not necessarily. He was just doing his duty. Just as a Scout is expected to do his duty to God and not expect a reward, so should all of us do our best to do our duty to God. We are God's servants and should not expect any reward beyond that which Jesus has already provided to us --- eternal salvation.

The servant probably had a job description of sorts. He knew what he was expected to do and also knew that additional duties were likely to be given to him from time to time.

We have a job description from Jesus. That is to love the Lord our God with all our heart, soul and mind and to love our neighbors as ourselves. That is our duty to God and one which we must never overlook.

The thrust of the scripture reading is that the servant's time and labor belong to the master. Similarly our time and labor belong to God.

Fred Craddock, et al <sup>(1)</sup> said, "Disciples of Jesus live by faith, even if it be as small as a mustard seed, but the life of trust is new each day. Like the manna in the wilderness, there is no surplus for tomorrow, no time in which there is more than enough for today. Disciples of Jesus live in obedience, but that, too, is new each day. One does not say, 'Now that I have completed all the duties of love, it is my turn to be served.' Such calculations are foreign to life in the kingdom of God."

"The life of faith Jesus points out is like planting seeds, waiting for God to use the efforts of God's people." (2)

Let us remember that as we gather around the Lord's Table this morning along with all Christians worldwide.

"On my honor I will do my best to do my duty to God ... and to help other people at all times."
